Federal Election now 'too close to call', after Pauline Hanson's speech at the National Press Club, as One Nation increases primary vote

Following Pauline Hanson's National Press Club speech, One Nation primary support is up 2% to 31.5% - clearly ahead of the ALP, down 1% to 27% and L-NP Coalition, up 0.5% to 17.5% - Liberals on 15% (unchanged) and Nationals 2.5% (up 0.5%).

Support for the Greens was down 0.5% to 13.5%, and Independents/ Other Parties were down 1% at 10.5% according to the Roy Morgan survey conducted from June 15-21, 2026, with a representative Australia-wide cross-section of 1,575 electors.

If a Federal Election were held now the result is 'too close to call'. On a two-party preferred basis, the result could be: ALP 51% cf. One Nation 49%

In many electorates at the Election the contest is set to be between the ALP and One Nation. When preferences are allocated for Coalition, Greens, Independent, and Other Party supporters between the ALP and One Nation the Morgan Poll estimates the **ALP 51% (down 2%) narrowly in front of One Nation 49% (up 2%)**.

If the contest is between the ALP and L-NP, on a two-party preferred basis (based on how electors said they'd 'vote' their preferences), the ALP is clearly ahead – ALP 54% (down 0.5%) cf. L-NP 46% (up 0.5%). However, when preferences are allocated based on how Australians voted at the 2025 Federal Election the gap is closer, ALP 52.5% (down 2%) leads L-NP 47.5% (up 2%).

The momentum from One Nation's '**FIRE THE LIAR**' online fundraiser, followed by Pauline Hanson's National Press Club speech, continued last week and in less than two weeks (since launching on June 10), the campaign has raised over \$4.7 million from around 75,000 donors – an average of just over \$60 per donor. The campaign tagline is targeting Prime Minister Anthony Albanese.

The complicated nature of the next Federal Election means there will be contests between the ALP and One Nation, the ALP and L-NP Coalition, One Nation and the L-NP Coalition, and any three of these parties against the Greens, Teal Independents, and other minor parties such as Katter's Australian Party (KAP).

This week Roy Morgan Government Confidence Rating dropped 1.5 points to 61. A large majority of 64% (unchanged) of Australians say the country is 'going in the wrong direction'. Only 25% (down 1.5% points) say the country is 'going in the right direction'.

There are considerable differences in the Government Confidence Rating by party. Government Confidence among ALP supporters was down 1.5 points to 128. However, for supporters of all other parties, Government Confidence continues to be below the neutral level of 100.

Greens supporters have Government Confidence of 62 (down 6 points), above L-NP Coalition supporters on 46 (up 10.5pts), supporters of Independents/ Other Parties have Government Confidence of 70 (down 1pt) and One Nation supporters have a Government Confidence Rating of just 9 (up 0.5pts).

Margin of Error

The margin of error to be allowed for in any estimate depends mainly on the number of interviews on which it is based. Margin of error gives indications of the likely range within which estimates would be 95% likely to fall, expressed as the number of percentage points above or below the actual estimate. Allowance for design effects (such as stratification and weighting) should be made as appropriate.
