ALP and One Nation are level on primary vote, but the ALP maintains a two-party preferred lead over the L-NP and One Nation

This week ALP primary support is down 1.5% to 27%, level with One Nation 27% (up 2%), and both well ahead of the L-NP Coalition, down 2.5% to 21% - Liberals 18.5% (down 2.5%) and Nationals 2.5% (unchanged), Greens, up 2% to 14%, and Independents/ Other Parties up 0.5% to 11% according to the Roy Morgan Poll conducted from August 17-23, 2026, with a representative Australia-wide cross-section of 1,508 electors.

Both major parties ALP (down 1.5%) and L-NP Coalition (down 2.5%) lost support this week, while the respective minor parties picked up support – Greens (up 1.5%) and One Nation (up 2%). The net result is little change to the two-party preferred result with the ALP maintaining an edge against either One Nation (53% cf. 47%) or the L-NP Coalition (52% cf. 48%) – both unchanged, from a week ago.

If a Federal Election were held now the ALP would win a majority against either One Nation or the L-NP Coalition

In many electorates at the Election the contest is set to be between the ALP and One Nation. When preferences are allocated for Coalition, Greens, Independent, and Other Party supporters between the ALP and One Nation, Roy Morgan estimates the **ALP 53% (unchanged) in front of One Nation 47% (unchanged)**.

If the contest is between the ALP and L-NP, on a two-party preferred basis (based on how electors said they'd 'vote' their preferences), the ALP is also ahead – **ALP 52% (unchanged) cf. L-NP 48% (unchanged)**. However, when preferences are allocated based on how Australians voted at the 2025 Federal Election the gap is closer, ALP 52.5% (up 1%) leads L-NP 47.5% (down 1%).

The complicated nature of the next Federal Election means there will be contests between the ALP and One Nation, the ALP and L-NP Coalition, One Nation and the L-NP Coalition, and any three of these parties against the Greens, Teal Independents, and other minor parties such as Katter's Australian Party (KAP).

A clear majority of Australians, 58.5%, say the country is 'going in the wrong direction' (down 2%). Only 27% (up 1%) say the country is 'going in the right direction'.

Analysis by gender shows 60.5% of men and 56.5% of women say Australia is 'going in the wrong direction'. In contrast, only 27% of men and just 27.5% of women say Australia is 'going in the right direction'.

Margin of Error

The margin of error to be allowed for in any estimate depends mainly on the number of interviews on which it is based. Margin of error gives indications of the likely range within which estimates would be 95% likely to fall, expressed as the number of percentage points above or below the actual estimate. Allowance for design effects (such as stratification and weighting) should be made as appropriate.
